Some time ago, I spoke with some of our community neighbours just south of Lymburn, in Ormsby. We spoke about the concerns with the heavy traffic and damage it causes along Ormsby Road West and East.

Ormsby Road East residents started seeing traffic volumes rapidly increase when Callingwood Road opened to the Henday; then another increase when building began west of the Henday.

The province's original plans had an interchange planned for 69 Avenue and Anthony Henday, but had to cancel the plan

Did you know you can report crime to the Edmonton Police Service online?

In October, the Edmonton Police Service (EPS) launched a new app for mobile devices that allows users to report some types of crime, and access news, social media activity and alerts from the EPS.

You can use the app to report 5 types of crime: damage to property, damage to vehicles, lost property, theft from vehicles under \$5,000 and theft under \$5,000. These types of crimes can also be reported online through the EPS website.

November is Prevention of Family Violence Month

November is Prevention of Family Violence month in Alberta. On Monday, November 3rd, the City of Edmonton held a proclamation for Prevention of Family Violence month.

Violence against a person is a crime. Family violence is a crime. Violent bullying is a crime. Dating violence is a crime. Child abuse is a crime. Elder abuse is a crime. Spousal abuse is a crime. Sexual abuse is a crime. Physical abuse is a crime. Are there even more kinds of abuse? You bet: emotional abuse, financial abuse, verbal abuse, psychological abuse, spiritual abuse, social abuse ... there are so many forms of abuse.

We seem to be very good at abuse, and it's high time we fixed that. Not so easy. But we can all help by being aware of how very common the forms of abuse and violence are in our neighbourhood, and taking small steps at a time to rectify it. That's important because abuse robs the abused, and it robs all of us: it "robs individuals and communities of their full potential by diminishing energy, hearts and spirits" (Colleen Klein).

There are massive amounts of information you can readily access to help you learn how to recognize the signs of abuse and violence on people of all ages. Alberta Social Services, your local libraries, and Alta. Child and Family Services Authority are just a few. There are simple and safe ways to let a suspected victim know that you recognize the signs that they are suffering some form of abuse without alarming them. And, extremely important: here is contact information you can use, or give to someone in need:

when they realized it would be placed too close to the Whitemud interchange. No contingency plans were made to accommodate Lymburn traffic access to, from and beyond the Henday. Ormsby Road East became the default route that accommodates over 2000 motor vehicles per day, I'm told. It is 600 metres long with 42 residential driveways fronting directly onto the Ormsby Loop.

So.... What can we as neighbours do? We can consider our options.

Statistics gathered over the past 4 years have seen an increase of an average of 0.40 vehicles per minute between 2010 and 2013. It may not sound like much, but when extrapolated over 1440 minutes or 24 hours, it means 576 more per day in 2013 than 2010! Ormsby Road East was designed to take traffic between its cul-desacs and 188 Street. Ormsby Road became a feeder road, changing traffic patterns throughout the area, causing concern for the residents along the Ring Road.

Groups within Ormsby worked with the City of Edmonton before the opening of the Henday in 2011. The Ormsby Road group requested concrete barriers at the entrance to The Woods to re-direct traffic to 184 Street. Transportation Services reviewed the request and declined it. For some time they placed camera/speed signs and speed sentries to either slow down or deter traffic on Ormsby Road East. They also placed Local Traffic Only signs at each entrance, reminding drivers they're entering a residential area. The logical route from Lymburn to the Henday would seem to be through Ormsby Road to the Callingwood Road interchange. The road actually designed to carry the traffic is 184 Street as the West Jasper Place (South) Area Collector Road and as such was designed to accommodate through North/South traffic.

When the Lymburn Surplus School site is developed it will create additional traffic as well.

With the design of the ring road, the huge increase in traffic volume and the connection through to the Henday, the residents of Ormsby have seen dramatic increases in the accidents in front of their homes. (I spoke with some residents in other communities that actually moved away from Ormsby because of the traffic issue on this ring road!) One year ago, one home in Ormsby had a car come over the grass and hit the house hard enough to end up through the concrete wall in the garage.

So.... What can we as neighbours do? We can consider our options.

- 184 Street is a through road directly to Callingwood Road interchange.
- 178 Street is a through road to Callingwood Road interchange as well.

So, if you're thinking about taking the Callingwood Road overpass, you may want to return to Lymburn via one of these options. Or on your way to the Henday, consider taking one of the main streets to get there. If you choose to take Ormsby, keep in mind it is a residential area, so please drive very carefully.
