A Note from Michael Oshry....

As summer draws to a close, Council will be getting back to business. There are a few major projects coming up including the future of Northlands and the 102 Avenue Bridge.

With the opening of Rogers' Place in September, the business model for Northlands has to change. They'll no longer play host to the major concerts and NHL games that made them profitable in the past.

In an effort to ensure the future viability of the site, the Northlands Board of Directors brought a plan called Vision 2020 to Council. In it, they proposed converting Rexall Place into

a six or seven rink community recreation facility and turning the outdoor racetrack into a permanent urban festival site. They also proposed extensive refurbishments to Hall D.

As part of the plan, Northlands has come to Council with request – debt forgiveness to the tune of \$47 million for the Expo Centre renovations. This isn't nickels and dimes, for either Northlands or the City.

The Northlands proposal will be coming back for Council deliberation on August 31 at a public hearing. Whatever the decision, this will have a big impact on the neighbourhoods around Northlands and the community of Edmonton as a whole.

Another big project which I'm sure came as a huge relief to many Ward 5 residents, the 102 Avenue Bridge re-opened in July. The infamous girder-bending incident caused delays to the project, and we anticipated the bridge would reopen in October 2016. But crews worked diligently and took advantage of good weather, allowing us to reopen the bridge three months earlier than expected.

There will still be some periodic closures to Groat Road and the trails in the area in the coming months as crews complete some of the remaining work, so stay tuned to social media or road signage for these closures.

Edmonton Neighbourhood Watch (ENW) by Sue Leighton

Edmonton Neighbourhood Watch can be pleased with themselves on account of the actions of one of our neighbours. It seems he was just watching the evening pass through his window when at one point, he observed several teens walking slowly down his front street. After a few minutes he realized the reason for the teens' slow pace was the result of them car hopping (going from one car to the next looking for unlocked vehicles and valuables that could be removed). The gentleman decided to follow Neighbourhood Watch's advice, and immediately reported this activity to the police. It paid off in the best possible way. Air One, the EPS helicopter happened to be finishing with a call and was still in the air. They were dispatched to the scene, and were able to apprehend the car-hoppers in action.

Had our neighbor not acted immediately, it wouldn't have been possible for the EPS to observe and apprehend these young men. What a perfect reminder that when we see a possible crime occurring or some questionable or dangerous activity, the first thing to do is notify the EPS. Most of us already know that we can do that on-line now, report it without charge on your cell phone at 377, call 911, or if you aren't sure about the criminality of what you're observing, call 780-423-4567, the EPS complaint line. The sooner "the boys in blue" know about a problem, the better their chances of resolving the difficulty.

In another neighbourhood where the residents do the Walk Your Block Program, a woman noticed a moving van pull up into the driveway of a house just a few doors down. Surprised, as she'd not heard that those neighbours were moving, she became suspicious and decided to find out about the situation. She approached the men and in a friendly manner, asked them if they knew where the Campbells (NOT the family's actual name) were moving to. The so-called movers didn't react to the false family name the woman had given them, and they named a town she realized was a made-up answer. She went back to her house and called the EPS immediately with a description of the men, the moving van and its license plate number (which turned out to be stolen). The outcome is not yet known, but if I hear, I'll add it to a future newsletter.

We can't and needn't be best friends with everyone in the neighbourhood, but it clearly pays to be familiar with them. What a fabulous excuse to hold a block party. This is exactly what our neighbours in the north of Callingwood did recently. Be sure to attend ours when it comes up!

Great News!! After weeks of meetings, discussions and emails, we can announce there will be a NEW Neighbourhood Watch Sign program. The City of Edmonton has agreed to partner with Neighbourhood Watch and manufacture the signs (which AMA used to do) and they will continue to install the signs. ENW will facilitate the program and the Edmonton Police Service will also partner with us on the program. We will be working together throughout the fall to develop the new Neighbourhood sign program. There isn't a lot to share yet other than it will start in early 2017 and there will be a new design for the signs. The details for the process have not been determined yet, but I'll pass them on as soon as they're available.

Soccer Report by Vic Brown, Soccer Director

The Outdoor Soccer Season opened on Sunday May 1, 2016. All 3 of our U12 teams played on that day.

We will start with the U4, U5 and U6 teams which play in house in Callingwood Lymburn. They have had a few rainouts and are looking to make up those games if possible.

The U8 Boys teams of which we have 4 teams and the one U8 Girls team are doing pretty well. We have 2 experienced coaches. One is from Europe and the other is from Chile. We also have 1 coach who has been coaching a U8 Boys team for 3 seasons, 2 indoor and 2 outdoor seasons. His name is Cam Roberts. This age group along with the U4, U5 and U6 teams do not keep a record of wins and losses.

The U10 Boys team started the season in Tier 3 and won enough games to graduate to Tier 2 for the second round. They are being coached by Andre Bloomer, Sr. and Jr. and the team is managed by Amyee Pearson. They are presently in first place in Tier 2.

The U12 Girls team, coached by Maria Kendall and Mike May are in second place in Group 1 after one game in the second round and our other U12 Girls team is coached by Justin Lupien (after an absence of 3 or 4 years of coaching in Glastonbury). He is happy to be back at Callingwood Lymburn. His team was decimated in the first round but is getting better by leaps and bounds with the addition of 2 Syrian girls. They are playing with our team as a welcome to Canada, and are sponsored by the EWZSA. They are presently tied for first place in Tier 3 after finishing the first round in last place.

The U12 Boys team, coached by Ron Pierce, won silver medals in the Duggan Spring Soccer Tournament playing against some of the top teams in other districts and are improving immensely.

The U14 Boys team, also coached by Ron Pierce, are currently in second place in Tier 4 (the top tier for community league teams). They won Gold Medals at the Duggan Spring Soccer Tournament. This team won Silver Medals in the Indoor Soccer Provincials and had to cut 7 players in order not to become an Edmonton Warriors telam. These players were transferred to Glastonbury and 8 players moved up to U14 for the spring season from his U12 Boys team because of turning 13 years old.

The U16 Girls team, coached by Tracey Stephen, is in the Tier 4 City Wide Community League standings, which is the usual spot for them.

I look forward to hosting another event next summer, and we will hope for blue skies and sun!

Finally, a big part of my job as an MLA is to talk to the community about their concerns. That is why I will be hosting a Business Mixer later this month. On Monday, August 29, join me and other business owners at Uncle Glenn's Pub (7666-156 Street) from 6:30 PM to 9:30 PM. Greetings from MP Kelly McCauley...

As we enjoy the summer – and the rain – I would like to give you a brief update on what I've been up to as your Member of Parliament. This past session of Parliament, the Conservative Official Opposition has been hard at work as the taxpayer's watchdog, defending your money, your values, and your future.

First off, we were very pleased to see the Liberals give in and provide extended El benefits in Edmonton after originally excluding the unemployed in the Edmonton region. While local Liberal MP's sat on their hands, I and other Edmonton Conservative MP's kept the pressure up through newspaper editorials, radio interviews and repeated questions in the House of Commons, until the Liberals finally relented.

The Liberal Government continues its plan to impose their version of electoral reform, without securing the consent of Canadians in the most democratic manner possible, a referendum. Your Conservative opposition has continually fought to bring any changes to our electoral system to you, the Canadian public; because we are resolutely committed to ensuring that your voice is heard.

My constituency office can also arrange a birthday or anniversary scroll, to help celebrate your special occasion. We can help facilitate celebratory greetings from the Governor General (birthdays 90+), and Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II (birthdays 100+, and anniversaries 60+). Greetings can also be obtained from the Lieutenant Governor, the Premier, your MLA, and the Mayor of Edmonton.

Edmonton, August 3, 2016: The all residential average sale price continues to remain strong at \$384,504 up almost 2% over the previous month and over 3% from July 2015. At \$450,366, single family homes experienced an increase in average price of over 3% from both the previous month and year. The 2% drop in average condo price month-overmonth can be partially attributed to the sale of several luxury properties in June that bolstered the average price. The average condo sale price for July 2016 of \$257,482 remains the same as July 2015. The average duplex/rowhouse sold for \$348,050; down 2% year-over-year (y/y) and down 1% month-over-month (m/m).

"We can attribute much of the average price increase to the strength of high end home sales. When we look at the median price of residential properties, we see a clearer picture of what is happening to prices. The median sales price for all residential is up less than a percent from last year. We are continuing to see strong stable pricing throughout the Edmonton region despite slower sales."

At 1,515 units reported sold, all residential sales in the Edmonton CMA were down 15% m/m and down 16% y/y. 938 single family homes were reported sold in July 2016, down 16% from the previous month and 16% from July 2015. Reported condo sales at 401 were down 13% over June and 25% from the previous year. Duplex/rowhouse sales at 154 in July are up 11% y/y but down 10% m/m.

"The July slowdown in unit sales is typical. May and June remain the busiest months of the year when it comes to sales volume. Every year we traditionally see a slowdown in July and August followed by an uptick in September," says REALTORS® Association of Edmonton Chair Steve Sedgwick. "There is no question that the pace and volume of sales has dropped. The positive side of this is that there continues to be a good selection of inventory for buyers."

The number of days the average home in the Edmonton Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) took to sell in the month of July was 56. This is up 3 days from the previous month and 6 days from July of 2015. On average, single family detached homes sold in 52 days in July 2016, while condominiums sold in an average of 61 days and duplex/rowhouses sold in 57 days.

Total new residential listings in July were 2,895, down 7% from July 2015 and down 5% from the previous month. There were 8,048 residential properties available in the Edmonton CMA at the end of July, down from 8,179 in June, but up from the 7,226 properties available on the MLS® System at the end of July 2015. That is up from 7,177 in June of 2015 and 5,609 in June of 2014.
